WA Primary Health Alliance (WAPHA) looks forward to contributing to the State Government's Sustainable Health Review and helping to deliver a healthier WA for all.

WAPHA believes that innovative service delivery and meaningful partnerships at the local and state-wide level are the foundation of a strong, effective patient-centred health care and will be a key factor in ensuring a sustainable health sector.

WAPHA chief executive officer Learne Durrington said that in the almost two years since the organisation was established, it had already made significant progress in commissioning innovative services and bridging the divide between primary and acute care, and primary and social care.
