In scope treatment activities will be undertaken from community-based facilities or outreach location as appropriate by suitably qualified and experienced employees.

The Country WA Primary Health Network (PHN) will continue to focus on the management of the performance of the contracted provider/s including reviewing, monitoring and evaluating service provision; taking into account the requirements of the Australian Government Department of Health, Disability and Ageing's PHN Program Performance and Quality Framework, to determine how well targeted and efficient services are delivered; and taking into account the requirements of the National Treatment Framework and National Quality Framework for Alcohol and Other Drugs.

Using the WA Primary Health Alliance Performance Management Framework (PMF), the PHN will measure and monitor provider performance against specified PMF indicators relating to health equity, patient-reported experiences, patient-reported outcomes and service cost effectiveness.





This data will be used by the PHN to inform the overall evaluation and performance of services and any necessary actions that may be required.

Activities will focus on early intervention, supporting those with mild to moderate alcohol and drug issues, addressing co-morbid mental and physical health issues, preventing relapses and facilitating referrals for those that require more enhanced support and treatment.

Treatment will be undertaken by suitably qualified and experienced employees from a community-based facility, outreach location or through the use of technology as appropriate.

The Country WA PHN will promote, support and facilitate opportunities to improve the cultural competence and clinical safety of internal and commissioned services through continuous quality improvement. The Cultural Competency Framework and Aboriginal Cultural Capability framework will inform practice and assist in identifying areas for further activity to improve the health outcomes for Aboriginal, CALD, LGBTQIA+ and other priority populations.

Treatment will be undertaken by suitably qualified and experienced employees from community-based facilities, outreach locations, or using technology (telephone or video conferencing) as appropriate.



Service providers are expected to work collaboratively with other stakeholders in the region to help facilitate effective and efficient referral and treatment pathways and system integration that actively seeks to engage with primary care to improve patient health outcomes.

The Country WA PHN will focus on the management of the performance of the contracted provider/s including reviewing, monitoring and evaluating service provision; taking into account the requirements of the Australian Government Department of Health, Disability and Ageing's PHN Program Performance and Quality Framework to determine how well targeted and efficient services are delivered; and taking into account the requirements of the national treatment framework and national quality framework for alcohol and other drugs. The PHN will continue to work towards achieving positive health outcomes through the delivery of quality, safe drug and alcohol treatment services. This includes the development of a consistent approach to the review, monitoring and evaluation of contracted providers performance. To increase the skills, capability and efficacy of the generalist and specialist health workforce to recognise and respond to current and emerging Alcohol and other Drugs (AOD) related harms.

To facilitate access for commissioned service providers and general practice to education and training to improve the management of AOD issues in a primary care setting.

Description of Activity

The Country WA PHN will promote the use of evidence-informed and culturally safe education and training resources, designed to support health care professionals to deliver culturally appropriate alcohol and drug treatment and support services.

The Country WA PHN will support education and training activities that reduce stigma and discrimination of people who experience harm from alcohol and other drug use.

Workforce development initiatives will:

- · Be targeted to specialist AOD providers, general practice, and the primary care workforce.
- · Reflect the principles of person-centred primary health care.
- · Embed lived experience leadership.
- · Promote care that is free from stigma, discrimination, or judgement.
- · Be evidence informed.
- · Promote cultural security.





Focus areas of workforce development will include (but are not limited to):

- · Developing core AOD workforce competencies for service delivery.
- · Assisting health professionals to understand issues that underly substance use, including intersectionality.
- \cdot Helping general practitioners (GPs) to develop effective approaches to engaging with, treating and supporting people presenting with AOD issues.
- · Integrating AOD into routine general practice.

Workforce development initiatives will be commissioned/delivered via different modalities, as relevant and appropriate to specific identified locations. This includes face-to-face or virtual delivery, and varying methods to suit local needs.

Activity Consultation and Collaboration

Consultation

During 2024-25, WA Primary Health Alliance undertook a review of current AOD commissioning activities and engaged in a redesign process with key stakeholders to inform future commissioning. This included a dedicated focus on workforce development. The Country WA PHN engaged with peak bodies (including WA Network of Alcohol and other Drug Agencies, AOD Consumer and Carer Coalition, Aboriginal Health Council of WA and the Royal College of General Practitioners), general practitioners, people with lived experience of AOD issues and the WA Mental Health Commission, via a series of meetings and/or face to face workshops held in January and February 2025, to ensure the Country WA PHN AOD program is effective, inclusive, and responsive to community needs.

The Country WA PHN engages with peak bodies, commissioned service providers, consumer/community representatives, subject matter experts, tertiary and vocational institutions, primary health care professionals and other key stakeholders to inform the planning, design, monitoring and review of workforce development activities.

Collaboration

The Country WA PHN will continue to collaborate with the WA Mental Health Commission through its formal partnership arrangement to coordinate planning and commissioning of alcohol and other drug treatment services, and associated workforce development initiatives.

The Country WA PHN also works collaboratively with the WA Country Health Service, the WA Network of Alcohol and other Drug Agencies, Aboriginal Health Council of WA, Royal Australian College of General Practitioners, Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine and other key stakeholders in the planning, development, commissioning and delivery of activities to grow and support a primary health care workforce that is equipped to recognise and respond to alcohol and other drug use and related harm.

To increase the supply, skills, capability and confidence of the generalist and specialist health workforce to effectively recognise and respond to problematic alcohol and drug use among Aboriginal people.

This will be achieved by:

- Increasing the number of suitably accredited organisations.
- Increasing the appropriateness of referrals to drug and alcohol specialist service providers.
- Increasing the uptake of screening, brief intervention, and culturally appropriate management of Aboriginal people with alcohol and drug issues within a primary care setting.
- Improving the cultural competence and capability of organisations delivering services to Aboriginal people.

Description of Activity

To achieve program objectives, the following activities will take place:

- The Country WA PHN will promote the use of evidence-informed and culturally secure education and training resources designed to support health care professionals to deliver culturally appropriate alcohol and drug treatment and support services for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.
- Increasing awareness of available specialist treatment services and improving effectiveness of referral pathways by engaging with local experts, encouraging development of multi-disciplinary relationships, and promoting utilisation of Clinician Assist (Clinical and Referral Pathways), Practice Assist and MyHealthRecord.
- Support education and training activities that reduce stigma and the discrimination of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who experience harm from alcohol and other drug use.
- The PHN will support consumers' involvement in the planning and delivery of services.



- Facilitate opportunities to improve cultural competence and clinical safety of services through continuous quality improvement and support to achieve appropriate accreditation.
- Providing access to specialist advice, training and support to assist Aboriginal organisations prepare for and obtain suitable accreditation to deliver alcohol and other drug treatment services in line with the National Quality Framework.
- Supporting initiatives to develop Aboriginal workers through professional training, leadership opportunities, mentorships and supervision.

Concurrent to this activity, WAPHA has committed to the development of a Cultural Competency Framework and an Aboriginal Cultural Capability Framework, which encompasses cultural awareness, cultural competency and cultural safety. These frameworks will facilitate opportunities to improve the cultural competence and clinical safety of services through continuous quality improvement and support programs. The frameworks will assist the PHN to reflect on current practice, identify areas that will improve cultural safety for communities, and develop cultural competence in internal employees and external stakeholders including commissioned services, resulting in better health and wellbeing outcomes for Aboriginal, CALD and LGBTQIA+ communities. The PHN will promote, support and facilitate opportunities to improve the cultural competence and clinical safety of internal and commissioned services through continuous quality improvement. The Cultural Competency Framework and Aboriginal Cultural Capability framework will inform practice and assist in identifying areas for further activity to improve the health outcomes for Aboriginal, CALD, LGBTQIA+ and other priority populations.
